Eldercaring Coordination reduces conflict among family members so they can work together more productively and focus on the aging person's care.

Eldercaring Coordination can help you when your aging loved one and your family most need peace!

- Manage high conflict family dynamics
- Support the aging person's self-determination to the extent possible
- Promote safety by monitoring at-risk situations
- Develop a support system for the aging person and family

Picture a compassionate court-alternative response to family conflict regarding an aging loved one.

A family would benefit from Eldercaring Coordination when there are:

• Elder isolated; family member(s) or guardian restricting information about elder

 Family arguing about elder's care, safety, capacity, guardianship, or use of elder's assets

 Report(s) to Adult Protective Services involving family conflict or miscare

· Mediation ineffective or impasse

 Multiple motions or reopened cases seeking micromanagement of elder's care

Guardians, attorneys, Adult Protective
Services, and other professionals can refer
older adults and family members for
eldercaring coordination. Court orders may
be required to initiate the process in some
locations. A court's order to participate
provides accountability for family members
to care for their ageing loved one and
emphasizes the importance of family
members learning to address concerns
more cooperatively, saving time and
resources for the family, the court, and the
community-at-large.

WHAT IS ELDERCARING COORDINATION?

Eldercaring coordination is a court-ordered dispute resolution process for aging persons, their families, and legally authorized decision-maker(s) to address conflict over non-legal issues that may impede the care and safety of the aging loved one.

WHAT DOES AN ELDERCARING COORDINATOR (EC) DO?

- Enables more effective communication, negotiation and problem-solving skills
- Offers education about care resources
- Facilitates the creation and implementation of an aging person's care plan
- Recommends strategies to enhance communication and collaboration with focus on the older adult
- Makes procedural or other non-substantive decisions as authorized by the parties or the court order

An EC is highly trained and experienced conflict resolution specialist that helps participants focus on the aging person, rather than past resentments, to improve the quality of life of their aging loved one. As high conflict situations and adversarial actions diminish, the family begins to work together and with appropriate experts to meet the needs of the aging person.

WHO PAYS FOR THE WORK OF THE EC?

The family and older adult share the cost of the EC as allocated by the Court, reducing time and money spent on <u>non-legal issues</u> compared to litigation costs. Attorneys continue to advocate in court on legal issues as necessary. Limited grants and scholarships may be available to defray a portion of EC's fees.

HOW OFTEN DO PARTICIPANTS IN THE PROCESS MEET WITH THE EC?

An EC remains available for up to two years to assist with the transitions experienced by the older adult, without delays and the lack of privacy experienced in court. Meetings are scheduled according to the needs of each family and decrease in frequency as communication improves and they can collaborate in well-informed decision making.
